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About Us.

Caritas Kitui is the Development Department of the Catholic Diocese of Kitui, established in 1978 and branded as Caritas Kitui in 2010. It aims at promoting human dignity, improved livelihoods and a just society with participation of community.

Caritas Kitui operates within Kitui and Makueni counties in the lower eastern region of Kenya reaching more than 300,000 vulnerable and marginalized rights holders.

Since 2013, Caritas Kitui has consistently sustained over 10 development projects annually, implemented in different pockets of Kitui and Makueni counties and has over 50 staff members annually reaching over 20% and 9% of the population in Kitui and Makueni counties, respectively.

Its work has been geared towards Integral Human Development, which is anchored on three main themes Innovation, Transformation, and Sustenance through integration and human rights-based approaches guided broadly by the Catholic Social Teachings.

Sustainable Livelihoods and Humanitarian Response

Projects under this thematic area focus on enhancing community resilience through inclusive economic empowerment and emergency support. They include the Partnership Project, Mtunze Punda Daima, IRRP, STAWI Mashinani Activity Project and the Promoting an Inclusive Community for People with Disability Project.

Environment and Climate Change

This area promotes ecological restoration and climate resilience through initiatives like the Carbon Offset Project, Clean Cooking interventions, and the GREENPARK Project.

Institutional Development and Resource Mobilization

Strengthened organizational capacity and sustainability are pursued under the GASP project, supporting strategic growth and efficient resource utilization.

Governance, Advocacy, and Social Inclusion

Projects like CJPD and the Strengthening Fiscal Transparency and Accountability Project empower communities to demand accountability, uphold human rights, and promote inclusive governance.



INTEGRATED RISK REDUCTION PROJECT (IRRP)

To build a thriving and robust community of 2,000 households living harmoniously in a healthy environment that sustainably provides for their needs by 2026 in Kyome -Thaana Ward.



Animal Health & Livelihood Support

6,975 livestock (cattle, goats, sheep, donkeys, dogs, cats) treated through veterinary clinics → Improved livestock health and productivity, boosting economic resilience for pastoralist households.



Agroecology & Food Security

Farmers trained in agroecological practices: seed saving, terracing, and diversified farming systems.

Revival of traditional storage methods (Kiinga & Kisumba) boosted food security and preserved Kamba cultural heritage.



Rangeland Rehabilitation & Biodiversity

32 acres of degraded rangelands rehabilitated through improved land management and reseeded → Led to enhanced pasture growth, improved livestock body conditions, higher farmer incomes, and restored biodiversity.



Water Access & Community Transformation

Constructed Tumila Earth Dam and 4 sand dams in Kyome-Thaana Ward, serving 350 households. This has reduced the time and burden of fetching water, improved water quality, enhanced water access hence improving education outcomes and enhancing women economic participation.

We watched our land die slowly. Springs dried up, gullies formed, and we had no idea how to stop it.

MAMA JUMA

In Itumba village, Kanyaa Sublocation, 59-year-old Winfred Kimanzi (Mama Juma) turned a barren 3.5-acre plot into a vibrant, productive ecosystem through IRRP training in soil and water conservation, agroecology, and land restoration.




Heavy rains during OND 2023 and MAM 2024 disrupted project timelines, particularly affecting water infrastructure construction.



Continuous stakeholder engagement - including community leaders, county & national government is critical in sustaining community participation and adapting to climate disruptions.

STRENGTHENING WATER RESOURCES MANAGEMENT



STRENGTHENING WATER RESOURCE USER ASSOCIATIONS (WRUAS)

Two WRUAs (Upper Ikoo and Upper Tyaa) were identified and supported, with one Sub-Catchment Management Plan strengthened and a WRUA resource mobilization training conducted, resulting in three proposals submitted to the Water Resources Authority. A county-level coordination forum was also established to enhance collaboration and catchment protection in upper Ikoo.

3 youth and 3 women farmer groups in Kitui Central and Mwingi West were trained on regenerative and conservation agriculture practices, contributing to improved soil health and climate resilience.

Practical training and demonstrations on catchment protection techniques such as Zai pits, semi-circular bunds, terraces, and tree planting were conducted to promote land restoration and water retention.

CHALLENGES

Human Encroachment and Unsustainable Irrigation Practices

Catchment areas, particularly along riverbanks, continued to face degradation due to farming and irrigation activities. These unsustainable practices undermined efforts in catchment protection and threatened water resource sustainability.

LESSONS LEARNED

There is a need for stronger enforcement of riparian protection policies, increased community sensitization on the long-term impacts of encroachment, and promotion of alternative livelihoods that are compatible with catchment conservation.



MTUNZE PUNDA DAIMA

Restoring Dignity: The Story of Donkey Welfare in Kitui

From April 2024, Caritas Kitui, with support from The Brooke East Africa embarked on a transformative journey to improve the welfare of working donkeys across the county. The project has engaged 88 Donkey Welfare Groups through targeted trainings, promoting humane treatment and best husbandry practices.

22 primary schools were reached to instill values of care and compassion for donkeys among young learners, fostering a culture of empathy from an early age.

In dusty marketplaces and remote villages, over 6,500 donkey owners were reached through vibrant roadshows and media campaigns. At the Kitui Agricultural Show, nearly 10,000 people stopped by the donkey welfare booth—each one walking away with new knowledge and inspiration to treat donkeys with care and compassion.



Animal health also saw major strides. Through a certified CPD workshop, 87 Animal Health Practitioners (AHPs) sharpened their skills. 30 AHPs and 30 agrovets were mentored through the mentoring frameworks done by the Project Veterinarians. This strengthened service delivery and improved access to veterinary care for thousands of donkeys.

In the shadows, illegal donkey hide trade remained a threat—but the project took it head-on. Caritas Kitui joined hands with legal and health institutions like the Mwingi Court Users Committee and County One Health Unit, together, they engaged over 36 high-level security stakeholders, building a united front against exploitation and bush slaughter.

Resilience was also planted—literally. Two community groups harvested over 600 bales of pasture with each 88 members replicating in their farms to ensure reliable feeds for their donkeys. Meanwhile, 65 savings groups (SILC) enabled donkey owners to invest in land, livestock, and small businesses funding donkey clinics and boosting livelihoods in the process. 2 offtake wells have been constructed and solarized at Tseikuru and Mui Ward reducing walking distance and providing clean water for the donkeys and their owners.

And in one of the project's most powerful moments, 101 donkeys were rescued from the brink of slaughter, a case now remembered as **“Rescued from the Arms of Death.”**



Challenges remained, Cartels exploited legal loopholes, and unregulated trade kept donkeys moving across borders unchecked. Yet, amidst these hurdles, a strong lesson stood out: community change agents, armed with compassion and persistence are key to lasting change.

As the project moves into its final quarter, it stands as a story of resilience, partnerships, and a growing movement that says: every donkey matters.

Improving Water Access and Livelihoods



WATER ACCESS

Constructed two sand dams (Kwamunyoki and Kwa Nzule), reducing water access distance from 15 km to 3 km for 600 households. Developed Kasunguni off-take well, benefiting 100 households by cutting water distance from 8 km to 2 km.



SCHOOL SANITATION

Installed handwashing facilities in Mwalili and Mutunga primary schools, improving hygiene for 450 pupils and teachers.



LIVELIHOOD SUPPORT & ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

Distributed Galla he-goats to 184 vulnerable households enhancing goat breeds and livelihoods for 124 households. Trained 60 individuals in goat and poultry management. Supported 6 SILC groups (150 members), who saved Ksh. 1,791,075 by end of 2024



SUCCESS STORY

Amid severe water scarcity in 2017, a community group adopted the SILC savings model, contributing just Ksh. 200–500 monthly. Through income earned from making interlocking blocks, they invested in goats and later benefited from improved Galla breeds supported by the project. By the end of 2024, their dedication transformed into a thriving asset base worth Kes. 492,525 and a growing goat stock of 73 kept by members. What began as a water intervention has evolved into a beacon of resilience and economic empowerment.

Challenges

1. Water scarcity due to inadequate rainfall affecting dam performance

Lessons Learned

1. Transparent and frequent communication with stakeholders is essential.
2. Realistic planning and timelines improve project execution.
3. Regular meetings foster collaboration, early problem-solving, and shared ownership.

SPECIAL NEEDS PROJECT

PROMOTING AN INCLUSIVE SOCIETY FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

Inclusive Education

- 28 CYWDs retained in school through education sponsorships
- 3 pilot schools (Central Primary, Kaveta Primary and St Michael Academy) implementing inclusive education where 15 children have been enrolled.



Healthcare and Rehabilitation

- 1,040 CYWDs identified, screened & referred for intervention during AIC-Cure Children Mobile Clinics.
- 3 medical camps with EARC Mumias and EARC Kitui at Muthale Satellite, Mutomo Special Sch., and Good Shepherd
- 116 CYWDs accessed epilepsy drugs and diapers
- 80 Health Workers & CHPs trained on early identification of disabilities.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

Inclusive Livelihood and Social Empowerment

- 53 parents and caregivers practicing kitchen gardening after permaculture training.
- 113 parents and caregivers practicing SILC with a saving base of KSh. 30,000-70,000. The beneficiaries can now buy diapers and drugs for their CWDs. and Kitchen garden
- 4 Youths with disabilities linked to job opportunities.

Challenges

Limited Funding to reach to the most remote parts of the County and facilitating county Ministry of Health Disability assistants.

Lessons Learned

Future project budgets should include a contingency fund to handle uncertainties like drought and medical emergencies.

ACHIEVEMENTS

Adoption of Climate-Friendly Technologies

10867 Communities members in Kitui and Makueni embraced sustainable technologies including solar dryers, biogas units, charcoal coolers, and a sump well—boosting nutrition, clean energy use, post-harvest management, and irrigation-based farming.



Growth of Green Enterprises

Green business initiatives flourished through support to entrepreneurs and groups in eco-friendly fuel production, value addition, sustainable charcoal making, and access to finance—leading to increased adoption of green strategies and income diversification



Enhanced Environmental Stewardship and Awareness

Thousands of farmers and students engaged in natural resource conservation and environmental learning through training, media outreach, tree planting, and school-based initiatives—resulting in large-scale land restoration and behavioral change.

CHALLENGES

Improving post harvest management

LESSONS LEARNED

- The long-term impact of interventions becomes evident over 2–3 years.
- Skill transfer and business maturity take time - continued mentorship needed.
- Multi-stakeholder collaboration is essential for scaling and sustainability - pooling government, private sector, and community efforts enhances impact.

CARBON OFFSET PROJECT

Promoting the use of improved cook stoves to reduce CO₂ emissions and combat climate change in rural communities.

OVERVIEW

Carbon offset project aims to reduce CO₂ emissions contributing to climate change by promoting the use of improved rocket cookstoves among rural communities in Kitui County, Kenya. By replacing traditional 3 stone fire cooking method with more efficient stoves, the project significantly cuts down on firewood consumption and associated emissions. The project's agenda aligns with SDG 13: Climate Action, which calls for urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts, which includes reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

PROJECT PROGRESS

As part of ongoing community-driven sustainability efforts, a total of 6,807 individuals have been sensitized through various grassroots platforms such as organized community groups, village elders' meetings, and consumer incentive forums. These mobilization activities were facilitated by village elders and local administrators, ensuring strong local engagement and trust.

Thanks to these efforts, the project has achieved the construction of 30,081 improved cook-stoves from 2013 to 2024. These stoves have played a pivotal role in creating cleaner air and healthier kitchen environments for households across rural communities. Each stove contributes to climate mitigation by reducing carbon emissions by approximately 1 ton of CO₂ annually.



By the end of 2023, these collective actions led to a significant impact, with **152,465 tons of CO₂** equivalent emissions reduced, as verified by Gold Standard in the **Fastenaktion Project Annual Report**. Building on this momentum, an additional **3,102 new cookstoves** were installed in 2024 alone against annual target of 2500 stoves, further accelerating CO₂ reductions and demonstrating the growing adoption of clean energy solutions in rural settings.

CHALLENGES AND LESSONS

A total of **192 stoves** were lost because of collapsed homes, migration, or repurposed kitchens. Unpredictable rains also disrupted early-year stove demand.

Nonetheless, **key lessons** emerged: longer stove usage leads to greater CO₂ reduction; maintaining compliance with Gold Standard is essential; integration with other community projects boosts adoption; and consistent use and maintenance of stoves is critical. These insights highlight the need for clear repair mechanisms, community engagement, and sustained usage to maximize environmental impact and improve long-term success.

MBATHA KIMEU'S STORY

"I began my journey in 2018 after a training session. Since then, the stove building has enabled me to pay school fees for my five children. In 2024, I bought a motorbike, which helps me reach more households. I also set up a small shop for my wife in Kiseuni Trading Center. This work has truly changed our lives."



CLEAN COOKING PROJECT

Caritas Kitui's Clean Cooking Project aims to transform household energy use by promoting the adoption of clean, energy-efficient cook stoves. Traditional cooking methods, which rely heavily on firewood and charcoal, pose serious health risks due to indoor air pollution and contribute significantly to deforestation and carbon emissions.

This project works with community groups, local leaders, and partners to raise awareness, train households, and distribute improved cook stoves. By replacing traditional stoves, the project not only reduces exposure to harmful smoke but also helps households save time and fuel, contributing to better health, environmental conservation, and improved livelihoods.

CHALLENGES

1. Unpredictable Climate Patterns



Strengthening Fiscal Transparency & Accountability in Kitui County

From Silence to Action: How Kitui Citizens Are Shaping Their Future

In the once-quiet villages of Kitui, public budgeting and fiscal accountability felt distant and inaccessible - complex matters reserved for county elites. That has changed. Through the Strengthening Fiscal Transparency and Accountability Project, a new wave of civic engagement has taken root across five wards in Kitui County. The initiative successfully empowered over 12 grassroots Accountability Champions in 5 wards in Kitui County and multiple civil society organizations (CSOs) with practical knowledge in public finance management, county budget cycles, and social accountability tools.

MILESTONE

12

Trained Accountability Champions are now catalyzing grassroots governance by educating community members and leading budget advocacy efforts.

24

stalled community projects were socially audited by communities under the guidance of the champions - reviving public interest in service delivery and demanding accountability.

Auditor General and Budget Implementation Review Reports were analyzed by CSOs, generating evidence-based advocacy and fueling citizen dialogue on resource utilization.

Increased civic participation: Champions mobilized community members to attend public participation forums, structure their development priorities, and submit memorandums - a shift from passive listening to active citizen agency.



CHALLENGE



Limited access to Bills of Materials (BoMs) constrained thorough project audits.



Lack of political goodwill to act on audit findings diminished trust in some areas.



Inadequate civic education agents meant that ¾ of Kitui County Wards remained unreached.

LESSONS LEARNED

Simplifying financial documents, using relatable language, and **proactive community engagement** notably increased trust, interest, and participation. Additionally, **early involvement in budget discussions** and **the formation of unified CSO coalitions** emerged as best practices for sustaining momentum


The Power of Lenten Campaign Funds





Funding per Thematic Area (USD, \$)




